In Missouri, Black males are 3 times more likely to die of an opioid overdose than White males



WHY USE MEDICAL TREATMENT FOR OPIOID ADDICTION?

- To help stop cravings for opioids such as Heroin, Fentanyl, OxyContin, and Percocet.
- It is the **most effective treatment** for opioid addiction.

You do not have to go away for 30 days to get better - you can stay in St. Louis and receive care at a local clinic



TREATMENT MEDICATIONS ARE:

- Buprenorphine (Suboxone or Subutex): an opioid replacement in the form of a tablet or film that lowers cravings and allows people to stay away from heroin, fentanyl, and pills
- Methadone (Methadose or Dolophine): a liquid replacement for opioids that stops withdrawals and lowers cravings. At first, you must take a daily dose at an Opioid Treatment Program (methadone clinic)
- Naltrexone (Vivitrol, Rivia, Depade): this medication is not an opioid replacement but helps to prevent cravings and can be given as a monthly shot or daily pill



Faith-Based Opioid Awareness

WHAT IS NALOXONE (NARCAN)?

Naloxone (often referred to by the brand name Narcan) is a medication that reverses the effects of an **opioid overdose** to restore breathing and prevent death, usually within 1-3 minutes.

THE 911 GOOD SAMARITAN LAW SAVES LIVES DON'T BE AFRAID TO CALL 911

- You can seek emergency medical help if you experience or witness a drug or alcohol overdose
- Under this law you will be protected from prosecution, arrest, and conviction for:
 - Possession of controlled substance
 - Possession of drug paraphernalia
 - Possession of an imitation controlled substance
 - Keeping or maintaining a public nuisance
 - Sale of alcohol to a minor
 - Possession of an altered ID
 - Purchase or possession of alcohol by a minor
 - Violation of a restraining order
- This law will **NOT** protect you from:
 - Distributing a controlled substance
 - Drug manufacturing
 - Active warrants

OPIOID OVERDOSE RESPONSE

- Check for breathing and clear airways
- 2 Lay the person on their back and give naloxone



- Call 911 (if you must leave the person, turn the person on their side in the recovery position)
- Administer rescue breaths (1 breath every 5 seconds)
- 5 If no response in 2-3 minutes, repeat Step 2
- Stay with the person until medical help arrives to ensure safety and prevent repeated use/overdose
